Since the 1960's call to overcome poverty in the United States, ATD Fourth World Movement has grounded itself with individuals and families in areas of significant poverty: with Hispanic and African American families in New York and New Orleans, with people of German, Irish, and Scot descent in the mountains of Appalachia, and with Native American people in New Mexico. And they are not alone in their resistance to poverty. This Movement belongs to so many workers, teachers, parents, academics, and people of different philosophies of life and religious convictions all over the United States.
